

CUPA'S HISTORY

CUPA was founded in the year 1991. One of the founding members was Crystal Rogers. She was born on November 17, 1906. Her love for animals began at an early age, culminating in a remarkable career dedicated to animal care and marked by compassion, hope and community. In 1959, she travelled to India en route to New Zealand, but never reached her destination. Appalled by the miserable plight of the animals she encountered, both stray and beasts of burden, she decided to stay on in India and build a sanctuary to house these unwanted creatures. Thus, in 1959, "The Animals Friend" in Delhi was born. Continuing to spread her word of compassion towards all sentient beings, Crystal Rogers moved to Jaipur in 1978 to initiate and build yet another safe haven for animals called "Help in Suffering"...In 1978, she was honoured by the RSPCA with the Richard Martin Award for her invaluable contribution to the field of Animal Welfare. Both the Government of India and the Animal Welfare Board of India paid tribute to her unflagging commitment towards animals by presenting her with the Prani Mitra Award (Friends of All Animals). Crystal Rogers influenced an entire generation of young men and women who, today, are actively involved in the field of animal welfare and animal rights issues in India. Noted among them are Maneka Gandhi, Member of Parliament, D.R. Mehta, former Chief of Securities & Exchange Board of India and founder of the Society for Scientific and Ethical Living, Jaipur, Amala Akkineni, founder of Blue Cross of Hyderabad and the current Trustees of CUPA.

In October 1991, at the age of 85, Crystal Rogers, along with Suparna Ganguly and Dr Shiela Rao founded Compassion Unlimited Plus Action (CUPA) at Bangalore.

Dan Ginsburg came into CUPA's life in 1999. His stupendous generosity and vision changed the organisation's trajectory, forever! He entirely funded the CUPA Animal Hospital and Shelter at the Veterinary College Campus in Hebbal. After 15 years, it has become a prestigious center for veterinary students of the college and still has a Trauma center section run by CUPA for the city's stray animals. CUPA has since grown to be the largest and most active animal welfare organization in the country!

CUPA TRAUMA CENTRE

TOTAL ANIMALS TREATED

The Trauma Centre is at the forefront of CUPA's promise to provide care for sick and injured stray animals throughout the city. This centre, located behind the Veterinary College building in Hebbal, receives and handles complaints about stray animals involved in accidents or suffering in other ways. Stray dogs and cats, as well as large animals, are treated after being brought in from different parts of Bangalore.

The trauma centre maintains two ambulances to respond to calls from all over the city. Tally Solutions Pvt. Ltd. provided the centre with several new medical equipment such as cautery machine, microscope, hydraulic surgery tables, surgical lights, and surgical instruments.

The most precious asset at the Trauma Centre, however, is its staff! Our expert veterinarians work tirelessly to address as many cases as possible in a single day. To respond to complaints, the receptionists and the ambulance crew work collaboratively. Of course, the centre would not be able to function without the assistance of the handlers, who maintain the facility and assist the doctors as they provide care.





LARGE ANIMAL RESCUE AND REHABILITATION CENTRE



What happens to a cattle that has outlived its economic value? Or a horse that has been permanently injured? Usually, one of two outcomes occurs: death or abandonment. In most cases of abandonment, the animals are simply pushed out onto the streets and left to fend for themselves. These are the unfortunate souls who find their way to the CUPA Large Animal Rescue & Rehabilitation Centre (LARRC). This centre was founded in 2012 with the objective of rescuing and rehabilitating large working animals. There are more than 100 cows, bulls, buffaloes, donkeys, horses, and goats living here.

Cattle generally end up at the centre for one of two reasons, depending on their gender: male calves are abandoned shortly after birth because they have no real economic value to the owner. They are either left to fend for themselves or sold to slaughterhouses, where they are kept in the most inhumane of conditions until slaughter.

Females, on the other hand, are used to produce milk for as long as possible until they stop for whatever reason. It could be due to excessive milking or if the cow is unable to conceive; in either case, the cow is unable to produce milk. When this occurs, they are viewed as financial burdens and are disposed of as such. These animals can be seen roaming the streets rummaging through garbage piles, where they are prone to poisoning, choking, and being involved in accidents.

The horses at LARRC were neglected by their owners because they were either permanently injured or had reached the end of their lives. Thoroughbreds that are no longer fit for racing generate no profit for their owners, and instead of receiving the strict care that these sensitive and fearlessly loyal animals require, they are either silently euthanized or thrown out onto the road.

Donkeys are perhaps one of the most abused and neglected animals, as they are used in intensive labour and abandoned when they are found to be incapable of doing so. Because donkey's milk is so expensive, the foals are frequently denied their mother's milk.

In their fear and confusion, combined with their injury, they frequently wander into oncoming traffic and injure themselves further. Once brought to the centre, treatment for these mighty beasts is a long and arduous process, and in some cases, the injuries are permanent.

SECOND CHANCE ADOPTION CENTRE



Second Chance Adoption Centre (SCAC) is located on a 2-acre property in Dommasandra, providing plenty of space for dogs to be socialised and rehabilitated. At any given time, there are over a hundred dogs sheltered at the centre! These dogs range in size from dachshunds to our very own indies to giant great danes, but they all share a history of neglect or abuse. The majority of them were either abandoned or abused by their owners, or they were rescued or discarded from breeders. There have also been cases of dogs being abandoned right outside our gates, where the perpetrator distracts the dog with food and secures them to the gates before fleeing.

Coming from these environments can result in a variety of behavioural issues in the dogs, and our dedicated and compassionate team of Ms. Sanjana, Mr. Chandrachur, and Ms. Yamini Devi who work tirelessly to socialise and prepare these dogs for adoption.





We have successfully rehomed countless dogs who had behavioural issues as a result of their mistreatment and abandonment. We have strict adoption procedures in place to ensure that the dogs' new homes are safe and appropriate for them. Adopters may need to return several times to get used to the dog, and vice versa. Adoptions are only permitted if the dog is compatible with both the owner and the environment. Follow-up procedures are also in place, with adopters providing post-adoption updates.




MYLLAPANAHALLI GERIATRIC CENTRE



The Mylappanahalli Geriatric Centre suffered a major setback at the start of 2020 and were asked to vacate abruptly. The centre was home to over 60 elderly, blind, neglected, abused, abandoned and senior dogs discarded by breeders. The centre was in desperate need of funds to find a new location and set up the necessary infrastructure for boarding and medical treatments for the dogs. The CUPA Geriatric Centre team was overwhelmed by the mammoth task of finding another place to provide the best lives to all of our canine residents in the midst of the first wave of pandemic. With the best of intentions and a strong team on hand, we are pleased to announce that the construction of the new dwellings was completed despite state lockdowns and strict protocols, just in time for the summer of 2021.

The Mylappanahalli Geriatric Centre located close to Yelahanka serves as a sanctuary and a permanent abode for elderly canines. The residents here are the elderly and sickly dogs that have suffered grievous injury or disease; these dogs cannot be released back to their neighbourhoods as they do not have the means to fend for themselves. Here they enjoy a quiet life isolated from the noise and commotion of the city and spend their days relaxing about the centre.

This facility provides a safe haven as well as a permanent home for senior dogs. The dogs who live here are elderly and prefer a quiet life away from the hustle and bustle of the city, spending their days relaxing in the centre.




The ABC-ARV program is set up and monitored by BBMP and has been in place for many years. The city is divided into 8 Zones, and the due process of calling for tenders and awarding the contracts to Animal Welfare Organizations that have been registered with the Animal Welfare Board of India, is followed. The entire operation is monitored by BBMP. Dog catching vans are fitted with GPS systems to ensure that all parts of the allotted area are covered. Reproductive organs of the operated dogs are stored in formalin and only discarded in the presence of BBMP officers or inspectors after they tally the numbers.

In 2020 - 2021, this being our first experience with a pandemic, we were unsure about how to deal with the lockdown and its effects. But the catching staff was out on the roads every day, since the program is considered an essential service. The risk was high, since details about the infection were sketchy, but the program continued.

Along with conducting the program, feeding of stray dogs was also taken up. Since all businesses, eateries, roadside food vendors were not functioning, food was cooked at the ABC centres and distributed to regular feeders.

HEAD OFFICE



Coordination between the city's 6 centres is a difficult task, but it is one that the administrative office in Ulsoor handles. The team here is in charge of streamlining all CUPA activities and initiatives and is therefore known as the nerve centre. The media and communications team is in charge of information flow both within the organisation and to the general public. This team is also in charge of raising funds for the organisation and keeping all of our donors, volunteers, and supporters up to date.


We collaborate with animal welfare organisations all over the country, as well as government officials, the BBMP, donors, rescue groups, and so on, and as a result, all proceedings must be meticulously documented.

The same team is in charge of event planning as well as logistical work.

This centre records and investigates complaints about animal cruelty or illegal breeders. The accounts department is in charge of the organization's financial records. All donations are received here and are then appropriately allocated.




CRUELTY RESPONSE



Several pet owners subject their animals to cruelties that are either intentional or unintentional, such as confining them in small spaces for long periods of time, disregarding signs of illness, providing poor diet, or harming them physically.

Bangalore City may well be the city in India with the greatest number of pet owners. Unfortunately, this does not imply that all of these creatures are living in safety and comfort. Several pet owners expose their animals to cruelties that are either intentional or inadvertent, such as confining them in small spaces for long periods of time, disregarding signs of illness, providing poor diet, or harming them physically.





Pets are also at risk of being abandoned, frequently as a result of increasing medical bills or the decision of their owners to relocate. Unlicensed, unethical, and unregulated backyard breeders have sold a large number of pedigree dogs. Backyard breeders operate their enterprises without the requisite licenses and permissions given by the Animal Welfare Board of India; this is typically done because they have not taken the necessary steps to ensure that the animals are kept in good health.

We also receive frequent reports of animal feeders being harassed by neighbours and pet owners being harassed by apartment residents and associations. We handle these cases through counselling and mediation, as well as educating the parties about animal protection laws.

STRAY CAT STERILISATIONS



Ajay Arjun, CUPA's head of projects and resources spearheaded the cat sterilisation project, scaling up cat sterilisation efforts for the organisation in different different parts of the city through structured Trap & Neuter programmes with volunteers from local residential associations.

The necessity for this initiative emerged as a result of complaints from several residential neighbourhood's regarding the growing cat population. At night, the cats fought over mates and resources, causing people to be disturbed. To combat the increasing overpopulation of cats in gated areas, CUPA started the Trap Neuter Release programme.

Since the program's inception, CUPA has successfully neutered over 3000 cats with the support from Help Animals India, the HCL Foundation, Robert Bosch Engineering & Business Solutions Pvt Ltd and cat lovers from across the city. The TNVR project involves a team of veterinary doctors, attenders, and supervisors on the ground working with residents of gated communities to trap, neuter as many cats as possible over the course of the programme.





The year 2020 - 2021 was significant for CUPA because it saw the continuation of our subsidised cat sterilisation on a larger scale. This enabled people to bring their community cats to the CUPA Head Office where our extremely skilled team coordinated and executed this programme .

This programme is successful only due to people who feed and care for community cats who take the time, initiative and effort in getting their community cats sterilised.

CUPA LEGAL REPORT



In a rather eventful year, CUPA spent most of its time nabbing illegal breeders and pet shops, that subject animals to cruelty. We sent out RTI applications to the State Government, seeking information on the list of breeders and petshops in Bangalore and received an overwhelming response. We tabulated a list and worked with the State Animal Welfare Board to ensure that they are registered and licensed. We also submitted the list of defaulters to the Karnataka High Court for action in the matter.

This year was particularly special, because Karnataka finally had a functional State Animal Welfare Board and a Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Animals that helped monitor cruelty cases in the State and issue departmental notices to the law enforcement for action.

One such breeder case that took the city by storm was the Puttenahalli Station breeder case, where upon a complaint being filed, we found nearly a dozen breed dogs housed in the worst conditions, really exposing the darkness of the breeding industry. Lack of veterinary care, food, shelter and even ventilation, left these dogs in the worst of health conditions, becoming a health hazard to humans as well. We were successful in taking custody of these dogs through a landmark decision of the Karnataka High Court.

CUPA recounts battle with illegal breeder



HC cites animal rights, reverses city court's order on 5 seized dogs

Bengaluru: The high court has reversed the order passed by a city magistrate court directing Compassion Unlimited Plus Action (CUPA) to return the custody of five seized dogs to its owner, Shreyas, a resident of JP Nagar 6th Phase, Bengaluru.

Allowing the petition filed by CUPA, Justice HP Sandesh noted that instead of relying on technical aspects that the investigating officer did not obtain court's nod for handing over the animals, the magistrate ought to have taken note of the consideration that the dogs have been treated with cruelty, kept in unhygienic conditions and the report of the veterinary doctor which stated the dogs sustained injuries.

"Right to live in a healthy atmosphere and right to get protection from human beings against inflicting unnecessary pain is a right guaranteed to the animals under section 3 and section 11 of the PCA Act read with Article 51-A(g) and (h) of the Constitution," the judge observed, referring to SC decisions on the issue.

On September 19, 2020, acting on a complaint filed by KB Harish, police had seized the animals from Shreyas and handed them over to CUPA. TNN

RWAs causing animal cruelty during COVID-19: PIL

Priority to Feed

To several animal rights activists this is of secondary concern. "Making sure that stray dogs are fed is the primary concern," said activist Nandini Singh, who helps to bridge the various Animal Birth Control (ABC) Groups in the city's right zones and have been feeding street dogs in their particular zones during the lockdown.

BBMP Special Commissioner for Animal Husbandry D Randeep said that the BBMP is trying to facilitate the feeding by providing food packets.

An informal survey of the various ABC's by DH revealed that about 2,000 dogs were being fed by ABCs in total. According to a BBMP survey in December, there are 3,09,972 dogs in the city.

Singh, however, explained that the absence of a government circular on the feeding of stray animals had prompted ordinary people to step in. "There are a large number of people running 'feeders' across the city. I can say that at least in Bengaluru, we won't see the problem of street dog starvation," Singh said.

No Pass Needed

Police Commissioner Bhaskar Rao specified that he had ordered his police to give "feeding" crews free passage at checkpoints, provided they had all safety equipment, including masks.

"Animals need food as well. At the end of the day, we should be a kind city. It shouldn't just be about economics and money," he said.

Alwyn Sebastian, an animal rights lawyer, who has filed the petition, said some of 150 complaints from apartment pet owners stem from a "tenfold" increase in reporting during the ongoing Covid-19 crisis.

"We included 25 of those cases in the PIL to show the court that these incidents were not an 'on and off' or isolated instances," he said, adding that the Chief Justice had noted that this is an "ongoing issue and requires the state to draft certain rules in this regard."

The 25 cases detail attempts by the RWAs to impose restrictions beyond dogs, to cats and birds. In some cases, physical assaults of pet owners or feeders had also allegedly taken place.

The court that heard the petition on Tuesday posted the matter on June 23 for the state's response.

Disproved beliefs

CUPA said there is a link in the increase of animal cruelty owing to now-disproved beliefs that pets were a vector of transmission for Covid-19.

However, that there had been animal cruelty at apartments over COVID-19 concerns was news to Vikram Rai, General Council member, Bangalore Apartments Federation (BAF), who nevertheless added that human-animal conflicts had been persistent for several years now.

"The BAF has existing guidelines about pet ownership," Rai said, clarifying it was illegal for the RWAs or AOAs to ban the keeping of pet dogs, even if done by consensus.

According to Dambal, the BBMP and the Karnataka Animal Welfare Board will conduct an immediate survey of the 140 shops to ensure their status. "If a person is running an illegal pet shop, that shop will be closed and the animals will be moved out," he said.

When asked on what grounds the shops could be closed down, Dambal clarified that the High Court had issued a notification in February, asking all dog breeders and shops involved in the pet trade to apply for a certificate from the State Animal Welfare Board within a period of three months.

"Almost none of the stores had come forward to apply. These shops can now be shut down because they do not have the said certificates," Dambal said.

An impromptu inspection later on Sunday revealed that several pet shops in the Shivajinagar area had been closed with an unknown number of animals inside.

Dambal added that all exotic and domesticated animals found in "illegal" shops would be handed over to animal shelters such as those operated by Maneka Gandhi's People for Animals (PFA) organisation.

A decision was also taken at the meeting to provide food for urban animals such as street dogs.

Dr Kumar said the BBMP would delegate three vehicles to do the task. "Food will be disbursed at fixed times between 7 to 9 am and 4 to 6 pm across the city's four zones," he said.

Veterinarians continue to render their service

"We recently got a Labrador that was maggot ridden after being tied to a tree," said Suranjana Ganguly, senior veterinarian at the centre.

The staff is now limited to four from 15, and the doctors are taking turns to ensure there is one of them at the centre every day.

Hospitals and clinics are also taking precautions keeping the pet guardians in mind. "We have taken precautions for the staff, such as wearing gloves and masks. An important notice we have put up is to limit one guardian per patient to ensure there is no community transmission," Dr. Vaseem said.

Around 40% of their staff is not reporting to work, either as a precautionary measure or due to lack of transport. "We are dividing work and managing. We are still getting cases from the public who bring in injured animals. This is something we are used to. But getting the public under control has been more difficult. As there are holidays, three to four family members come with one patient," he said.

Aaswin K. Cancure Pet Hospital said: "Right now, we are looking at important cases only. We advise owners to call before coming."

Mother and Foal Rescue



We received a complaint by reporter Madhusudan from Holiday village road community area, Anjanapura regarding a pony gasping for air . As observed the mother horse was also present with the pony alongside with no injuries or wounds.

In discussion with the reporter, we requested to look around for the owners or any horse stable in the location.

Later in the day the reporter met the owner and advised him to take care of the horses. They also had few volunteers to track their whereabouts.

Following day, the owner had only taken the horse and denied the ownership of the foal. A volunteer in the area took the foal under his care for the day. We requested reporter Madhusudan to take the initiative on behalf of the community and raise a police complaint so that CUPA could rescue the poor baby. Meanwhile the Mother horse trotted back in search of the pony and reunited with her baby, to confirm that the owner was inhumanly trying to separate the mother from her child. The little foal looked healthy and actively suckled from her mother. Our rescue team immediately reached the location along with our Animal cruelty officer Mr. Tejeshwar.

Our team accompanied with reporter Madhusudan gave the police complaint on the cruelty involved and to rescue the horses immediately. The mother and foal were not to be found later that day as they had moved to another location.

On 22.12.20 reporter Deepali reported the horse along with the pony injured and attacked by dogs.


We rushed to the location, gave the necessary note to the police on the rescue and picked up the horse and the little pony. The horse and the little baby are safe and have recovered under CUPAs care.

Recovery of breeder discard - Husky

Due to illegal and unregulated breeding of dogs. Many dogs are found abandoned on the streets. Kushka, an extremely sweet and friendly husky, was admitted to CUPA Trauma Centre with a severe case of skin infection. Breeders possibly discarded the dog after they found medical treatment costs extremely high. The dog was admitted, treated and after a lot of effort, he successfully adopted into a good family.

The Animal was admitted with a large heavy tumour on the side of the body. This looked like the tumour had been growing for many years untreated. The poor dog was in obvious pain and discomfort. The tumor had to be surgically removed and was found to be bigger than a football. With medical supplements, regular antibiotics and painkillers the dog headed for a speedy recovery. The dog was also vaccinated, neutered and released.

A cat was brought in to the CUPA Trauma Centre with a severe skin infection. It was possibly a mite infestation or common scabies which are highly contagious mites that can spread from one animal to another through skin contact. The cat was administered medications and topical ointments to ensure full recovery. The transformation from sickly and lethargic to very active, was phenomenal. The cat was vaccinated, sterilised and released post recovery.

TREASURER'S REPORT



The FY 2020 was extremely challenging for CUPA. The year started with uncertainty and fear of the unknown, looming large. Various establishments shut down causing huge economic and financial burden on the general public – the very people who keep CUPA alive by donating and supporting our 100 strong staff, 500+ in-house animals at CUPA shelters, and thousands of street animals.

Thankfully we held ourselves together to ensure that no staff or animals at our centers suffered the consequences of the ovid-19 induced lockdown. We turned to our regular donors, CSR and institutional partners for financial help during the months of April, May, June and July 2020. We not only managed to feed 4000+ animals when movement around the city was restricted but also ensured that staff salaries were paid in full to ensure that staff and their families did not suffer. Most of our operations continued within limited capacity which included medical treatments of stray animals, attending to cruelty cases and running of the CUPA Clinic to provide continuous and subsidized medical access to pet animals.

We would like to extend our heartfelt thanks to our institutional partners like HCL Foundation, Robert Bosch Engineering & Business Solutions Pvt Ltd, Walmart, VmWare Foundation, Tally Solutions, Ashraya Hastha Trust, Azim Premji Foundation, Infosys Foundation, Rohini Nilekani Foundation Philanthropies and many more donors whose support was invaluable in the financial year.

The organisation saw a significant increase of approximately 12.5% in the income of the year. We also had extensive and corresponding expenses due to scaling up of operations, despite the covid situation. Picking up distressed animals, feeding strays, sheltering geriatric dogs, rehoming abandoned dogs and those victims of cruelty cases confiscated by our cruelty cell were all critical expenses of running costs.

The board of Trustees also felt the need to upgrade crucial infrastructure. Due to overcrowding, the old CUPA clinic at RT Nagar seemed too small to accommodate hundreds of patients due to the new social distancing norms and danger of a covid surge within the premises. We took a bold step to move the clinic from a 1500 sq foot premises to a three-storey, 5000 sq foot premises to accommodate state of the art facilities for pets at affordable rates. The project was one of the biggest and most challenging over the years. A special thanks to Mr Pranay Chamria who helped plan the whole project and Mrs Kamini Gulati who was kind enough to step in and execute the interiors of the New CUPA Small Animal Specialty Hospital reducing the cost burden as compared to the inflated rates quoted by multiple other contractors .

We collectively need to ensure that the pace is maintained for the next financial year and that protocols and processes are in place for all activities. The increase in income is layered with more responsibility to ensure funds are well spent and systematically utilized for greater reach, to help animals in distress all year round.






